#### **Priorities for 2024-25**


- Align with TMU's Strategic Vision and related plans

- Planning for the School of Medicine's 2025 launch






# **Operating Revenues & Expenditures**

#### **Domestic Enrolments**

- Total number of domestic undergraduate students increased this year due to high demand
- Current plan:
  - Slight reduction in the number of new first year domestic students, keep intake steady in the following years to stay near our funded cap
  - This will mean an annual intake in line with the average for recent years
- Application data for 2024-25:
  - TMU remains a popular choice for students
  - Projected that we will meet domestic intake targets




#### **International Enrolment**

- Uncertain environment:
  - Cap in visa permits announced by federal government
  - Temporary pause in visa processing
  - Provincial government's decision on allocation of spaces pending

- Launched a winter intake for international students:
  - Mitigates the impact of visa processing delays
  - Aligns with academic calendars in the southern hemisphere

#### **Provincial Context: Tuition Fee Policy**

- Continuation of tuition fee freeze for domestic students within province for 2024-25 and beyond
- In 2019-20, a decrease of 10% to domestic tuition fees in comparison to 2018-19 levels was implemented
  - Tuition for Ontario students has remained frozen since with no adjustments for inflation
- Impact of reductions and freeze will echo into future years, as any subsequent increases will be based on the lower fee level and can never be recovered



## **Provincial Context: Blue-Ribbon Panel Report**

- November 2023: Blue-Ribbon Panel on Postsecondary Education Financial Sustainability report released
  - Noted the serious challenges facing universities across Ontario as a result of years of underfunding
- Panel's recommendations:
  - ➤ Increase tuition by 5% in most programs for 2024-25, followed by annual increases of 2% or rate of inflation
  - ➤ Increase government operating grants to universities by 10% in 2024-25, followed by annual increases of 2% or rate of inflation
  - ➤ Increase the number of funded domestic student spaces at universities that are seeing high student demand in 2025-26





# **Operating Budget**

- Reflects portion of overall budget that is within our discretion
- Consolidated budget includes items not within our discretion (e.g., research grants, special capital grants)
- Operating budget includes expenditures such as:
  - Academic departmental budgets
  - Student financial assistance
  - Infrastructure maintenance
  - Utilities
  - Other non-salary expenses



# **Uncertain Environment for Budget Planning**

- TMU is developing its 2024-25 budget in an environment that includes:
  - Tuition fee framework for 2024-25 announced February 26 (continuation of freeze)
  - Uncertainty related to provincial operating grant funding
  - International recruitment challenges due to visa caps and temporary pause to processing of applications
  - Salary and benefits cost escalation



#### **Baseline Scenario**

What would our budget look like without any additional funding from government this coming year?

#### Revenue projected to increase by 1.4%

- No increase to operating grants
- Continued freeze of domestic tuition fees for most programs

#### Costs projected to increase by 3.8%

- Core inflationary escalations: salary, benefit & central non salary
- Gradual increase to deferred maintenance
- Total shortfall without additional funding would be \$15.3M
- Awaiting confirmation of what we will receive from government to reduce this shortfall



### Government Announcement: February 26, 2024

- Continuation of tuition freeze
- \$700M in broad-based funding temporarily over 3 years to be distributed across the college and university system
- \$203M for institutions in greatest need (application will be required; criteria and timing not yet announced)
- \$100M for unfunded STEM enrolment across universities and colleges
- \$167.3M for capital repairs and equipment
- Smaller amounts for mental health; a research computing system; small, northern and rural grants; and hiring reviewers to find savings
- Grants will come with accountability and report-back requirements
- No information about distribution of international enrolments



## Implications for TMU

#### What does this announcement mean for TMU?

- Need clarity on:
  - Split between colleges and universities
  - Share for TMU
  - Restrictions for specific initiatives or purposes
  - Short-term versus ongoing funding
  - Distribution across the three years
  - Decisions on international enrolment

We will update scenarios and share with community once we have details from government.
