Tenure-Track Positions

All applicants must have completed a PhD in Economics (or expect to do so by August 2010). Applicants at the Assistant Professor level must show potential for excellence in teaching and research. Applicants at the Associate or Full Professor level must have established records of ongoing excellence in teaching and research.
