Background

The Ryerson Centre for Immigration and Settlement (RCIS) was established by Ryerson Senate in March 2011 and has been in operation since July of the same year. The overall goal of RCIS is to advance policy-related research and scholarship in the areas of immigration and settlement studies, both nationally and internationally.

The establishment of RCIS has occurred in the context of a strong research and teaching presence related to immigration and settlement studies at Ryerson. In particular, Ryerson launched the interdisciplinary Graduate Program in Immigration and Settlement Studies (ISS) in 2004, and the interdisciplinary PhD Program in Policy Studies with a field of specialization in Immigration, Settlement, and Diaspora Policies in 2009. RCIS's research focus complements these graduate teaching programs.

RCIS aims to be a leader in the transdisciplinary exploration of international migration, integration, and diaspora and refugee studies. In addition to supporting research in these areas, the Centre's mission includes mentoring students and consolidating Ryerson's reputation as the pre-eminent site of knowledge development and exchange with governments, community organizations, and academics.

This report reflects on RCIS's operation in 2012-2013. In particular, it summarizes the Centre's activities and accomplishments, evaluates these activities vis-à-vis RCIS's strategic planning objectives, and outlines future activities and strategic planning.

Governance & Affiliates

RCIS continues to implement the governance and administrative structure outlined in the founding document passed by Ryerson Senate. The 2012-2013 **RCIS Advisory Committee** consisted of three members from the Faculty of Arts and three members from the Faculty of Community Services, two student representatives from the Policy Studies PhD Program and the ISS Program, and the Academic Director Harald Bauder (Appendix A).

Knowledge Mobilization

The number of **RCIS Affiliates** has grown to an impressive 37 Ryerson faculty members since the establishment of RCIS (Appendix B). The recruitment of affiliates represents an effort by RCIS to establish a campus-wide community of immigration and settlement researchers.

RCIS has organized and hosted numerous **events**. These events have facilitated multiple strategic goals, including capacity building, partnership development, outreach to the immigration and settlement community, and the enhancement of Ryerson's and RCIS's reputation.

Future Outlook & Strategic Planning

This section evaluates RCIS' activities and accomplishments in relation to the *RCIS Strategic Plan, 2012-2016*. This plan's 6 objectives and 8 concrete strategies are aligned with RCIS's founding document and Ryerson University's planning document *Shaping Our Future: Academic Plan for 2008-2013*.

Objective 1: Scholarly Research and Creative Activities (SRC)

The SSHRC-funded project "Integration Trajectories of Immigrant Families" will commence in the Summer, 2013. The anticipated concrete outcome in 2013–2014 will

be several RCIS Working Papers. In addition, networking activities will occur between RCIS affiliates, community partners in this project, and the wider community.

- *Recommendation:* Continue and deepen productive research partnerships and expand research network. Attract additional partners to the project “Integration Trajectories of Immigrant Families” and pursue additional funding sources.

RCIS has accelerated its knowledge mobilization activities and collaborated successfully with partners to co-sponsor and/or co-organize events. In the 2013–2014 academic year, RCIS will closely coordinate activities with a remodeled CERIS. RCIS Director, Harald Bauder, has served on the Development Committee, which planned the transition of CERIS.

- *Recommendation:* Continue organizing and sponsoring events, and developing partnerships. The RCIS Director will sit on the CERIS Management Board with the main role of coordinating RCIS and CERIS activities.

Objective 2: Student Engagement

RCIS has developed a solid track-record of involving students in research, knowledge mobilization activities, and administration. A part-time coordinator and student research assistants have helped to successfully conduct RCIS activities. In addition, the project “Integration Trajectories of Immigrant Families” has budgeted several research positions for PhD and MA Students, which will further enhance student engagement.

- *Recommendation:* Institutionalize the RCIS-Policy Studies-MCI Fellowship and ISS Research Assistantships and Placements, so they can be provided on an annual basis. Develop an RCIS-MCI postdoctoral fellowship.

Despite numerous applications, RCIS was unable to acquire a Work Studies or similar position.

- *Recommendation:* Strengthen Work Studies and similar applications.

Objective 3: Research and Learning Environment

RCIS is located in an office on the 6th floor of Jorgenson Hall; it has also been able to temporarily use a small office on this floor to accommodate visitors. Although this space has enabled RCIS to sustain its operations, it is ineffective in fostering meaningful and stimulating interaction between RCIS affiliates and students. A more suitable office space would be coordinated with student space allocated to the ISS and Policy Studies programs.

In addition, space is very tight. Several research assistants will need to be accommodated to work on the project “Integration Trajectories of Immigrant Families.”

Since January 2013, the RCIS office is also used by the ISS placement officer, Farishta Dinshaw. While shared RCIS and ISS space is highly desirable, more space should be made available.

- *Recommendation:* Secure centrally-located permanent space to be shared with ISS and Policy Studies students and staff to create an effective research, learning, and creative environment.

Objective 4: Funding

With two successful SSHRC grant applications, RCIS is beginning to establish a funding track-record. However, this funding is not yet sufficient to be financially independent. In addition, SSHRC funding cannot be used for operating expenses and administrative assistance. RCIS receives annual funding from the Offices of the Provost, the Dean of Arts, and the Dean of Community Services. This funding, however, is incrementally reduced, so that additional funding sources will need to be identified.

- *Recommendation:* An aggressive funding strategy should identify funding from private foundations and/or sponsors to cover core expenses.

The RCIS founding document passed by Ryerson Senate in 2011 lists as the first “Activity” to “Establish an endowed Research Chair in Immigration and Settlement”. This activity has not yet been pursued:

- *Recommendation:* Work with the Offices of the VP, Research and Innovation and VP, University Advancement to raise funds for this endowed chair.

The budget of RCIS’s founding document passed by Ryerson Senate states that the responsibility to raise funds from other sources “requires broader discussion between the Deans and VPRI and the Provost concerning the distribution of grant overheads. Any shortfall will be funded by the Deans of Arts and Community Services in the same proportion as the distribution of the overheads.”

- *Recommendation:* Initiate discussions on the matter of grant overheads with the VPRI and the Deans of Arts and Community Services.

Objective 5: Administration and Governance

RCIS has an effective governance and management structure. The current RCIS Advisory Committee equally represents the Faculty of Arts and the Faculty of Community Services, as well as students in the ISS and Policy Studies PhD programs.

- *Recommendation:* Expand the RCIS Advisory Committee to include community representation.

Objective 6: Reputation

RCIS events, exposure in mainstream media, and the active participation in social media have enhanced the reputation of RCIS and Ryerson University. As in the past, the locally-relevant and applied nature of RCIS events has contributed to Ryerson's role as a City Builder, and partnerships and collaborations in organizing these events have been extraordinarily effective in expanding RCIS's communication network.

RCIS has hired media consultants Bradley Lee and Isabella Tartar to attract media (incl. social media) coverage to the 2013 RCIS Conference. In addition, RCIS was able to receive significant media attention, including in *The Globe and Mail*, *The Toronto Star*, *University Affairs*, *The Telegraph (UK)*, *Baden-Württemberg (Germany)*, and *OMNI News* (Appendix X).

- *Recommendation:* Continue organizing high-profile events, engaging with media, participating in social media, and fostering collaborations within and beyond the Ryerson Community.
