The Balance of Care

In time for the October 23rd symposium on regionalized models for community support services, the CRNCC has a new fact sheet, *The Balance of Care*, to share with you. The Balance of Care is a British methodology which determines the most appropriate balance of community and institutional based care in any local area. It asks what percentage of frail seniors eligible for Long

Term Care placement could be safely diverted to the community with better outcomes for them, their carers and the health system as a whole if appropriate, cost-effective and integrated packages of community based services were available.
