Setting the Balance of Care in Waterloo Region – Research findings to be released on October 16th

Balance of Care Workshop with Drs. David Challis and A. Paul Williams

What proportion of seniors now on long-term care (LTC) wait lists could be appropriately and cost-effectively maintained in the community? Led by Dr. David Challis, University of Manchester, UK, and Dr. A. Paul Williams, University of Toronto, this workshop presents evidence from a groundbreaking study in Waterloo Region which suggests that large numbers of those waiting for LTC beds could “age in place” in community if coordinated, integrated care packages were available.

Dr. David Challis is responsible for national studies of coordination in older people’s services,

evaluations of assessment procedures in England and studies of old age mental health services. He is a professor of Community Care Research and Director of the Personal Social Services Research Unit (PSSRU) in the UK.

Dr. A. Paul Williams has taught and published nationally and internationally on health systems and health policy, with emphasis on the role of community-based services in maintaining the health and well-being of seniors. He is a professor in the department of Health Policy, Management and Evaluation at the University of Toronto.
