The Canadian Research Network for Care in the Community (CRNCC) in partnership with the Ontario Community Support Association (OCSA) is proud to present the fourth in an annual series of fall symposia highlighting crucial issues in home and community care, globally, nationally, and locally.

Integration is now at the top of the policy agenda in Ontario, as in other Canadian provinces, where Local Health Integration Networks (LHINs) are working hard to break

down health care silos, forge stronger links across the continuum of care, and ensure that vulnerable people and their caregivers get the most appropriate care, in the most appropriate place, when they need it, in the most cost-effective way.

This year's symposium, moderated by **Cal Martell** (Ottawa Hospital & Regional Geriatric Program), highlights key challenges and opportunities for integrating home and community care for vulnerable populations including at risk older persons, persons with disabilities, and those facing mental health and addictions problems.

It features top national and international speakers who will share their insights into what works and what needs to be done at the local level to successfully integrate home and community care for vulnerable populations.

#### Featured speakers include (alphabetically):

- **Jenny Billings** (Centre for Health Service Studies, University of Kent, UK) who will examine what evidence-based practice elements can be developed to show outcomes of integrated care initiatives, and what can be considered "good outcome measures"
- **Marcus Hollander** (Hollander Analytical Services Ltd, BC) & **David Pedlar** (Veterans Affairs Canada, PEI) who will present new evidence on continuing care initiatives in Canada and their outcomes
- **Kai Leichsenring** (European Centre for Social Welfare Policy & Research, Austria) who will draw on experience from nine European countries to outline political, structural, and organizational conditions crucial for implementing best practice models of integrated care
- **Janet Lum** (Ryerson University and CRNCC, ON) who will set the stage by

outlining different approaches to integration which bring care to people (home care); people to care (day programs, congregate dining); and combine housing with care (supportive housing, attendant care, cluster care)

- **Henk Nies** (Vilans, the Centre of Expertise for Long-Term Care, the Netherlands) who will present "on the ground" insights and outcomes from the Netherlands's user-driven regional integration initiatives
- **A. Paul Williams** (University of Toronto & CRNCC) who will present findings from Balance of Care (BoC) research projects across Ontario which consistently emphasize the need to integrate home and community care to support the quality of life, independence and well-being of vulnerable individuals and caregivers, while also building health system sustainability.

This symposium also features a "town hall" discussion which aims to surface integration challenges and opportunities currently experienced by participants including front-line providers, consumers and policy-makers. While integration challenges are global, solutions are local.
